Sandra Laugier is Professor of Philosophy at Université Paris 1 Panthéon Sorbonne, Paris, France, Deputy Director, Institut des sciences juridique et philosophique de la Sorbonne (UMR 8103, CNRS Paris 1. She is Principal Investigator of the European Research Council Advanced Grant project DEMOSERIES. She has extensively published on ordinary language philosophy (Wittgenstein, Austin, Cavell); moral philosophy (moral perfectionism, ethics of care); democracy, and civil disobedience. Her recent work focuses on popular culture, film, and TV series and gender studies. She is the translator of most of Stanley Cavell's work in French. She has been Visiting Professor at the School of Criticism and Theory (Cornell University, 2023), the University of Toronto (2022), La Sapienza Roma (2019), Boston University (2019, 2021), Pontifical University Lima (2017); Visiting Researcher at the Max Planck Institute Berlin (2014, 2015); Distinguished Visiting Professor at The Johns Hopkins University (2011, 2008); Facultés Saint-Louis, Bruxelles (2009).

Some of her awards include: Senior Fellow of Institut Universitaire de France (2012-2023), Chevalier de la Légion d'Honneur, (2014), Grand prix de Philosophie de l'Académie française (2022).

Among her recent publications: Why We Need Ordinary Language Philosophy (The University of Chicago Press, 2013), Recommencer la philosophie, Stanley Cavell et la philosophie américaine (Vrin, 2014), Nos vies en séries. Ethique et philosophie d'une culture populaire (Flammarion Climats, 2019), Politics of the Ordinary. Care, Ethics, Forms of Life (Peeters, Leuven, 2020), Must We Mean What We Say? at 50 (ed. with Greg Chase & Juliet Floyd, Cambridge University Press, 2022), Les Séries. Laboratoire d'éveil politique (CNRS Editions, 2023), Television with Stanley Cavell in Mind(ed. with David LaRocca), TV-Philosophy in Action. The Ethics and Politics of TV Series and TV-Philosophy. How TV Series Change our Thinking (all published at University of Exeter Press, 2023). Wittgenstein. Senses of Use (The University of Chicago Press, forthcoming). In search of a story, a German film team finds itself in the Mexican village of El Alberto. The so-called Caminata Nocturna has made the small community famous. A tourist attraction based on the experiences of the villagers that reenacts the illegal border crossing into the United States. What once started as a performance to make the local youth aware of the dangers of illegal migration has now become one of the village's main sources of income. Netflix visited. Italian, Japanese, Austrian and other productions, too. And now the Germans. While around them the village unflinchingly goes about its business, claims rights to its own image and subject, supplying border patrols, dangers and reenactments in a lucrative capital barter, their stay develops into an unintended exploration of the possibilities and limitations of cinematic representation.

BIOGRAPHY OF DIRECTOR

André Siegers was born in Mönchengladbach, Germany. He studied Anglistics at the Heinrich Heine University in Düsseldorf and Film at the Hamburg University of Fine Arts. His first feature-length documentary SOUVENIR premiered at the Forum of the Berlin International Film Festival. He subsequently collaborated in a number of films, including OLANDA by Bernd Schoch and STATUS AND TERRAIN by Ute Adamczewski. Together with Alejandro Bachmann and Bernd Schoch, he conceived and presented the moving image series Abgeguckt at the Volksbühne am Rosa-Luxemburg-Platz. He lives as a freelance filmmaker and author in Berlin.
